The November First Friday Sale has been cancelled, due to family health concerns the coordinator and some of the regular workers. Please keep them in your prayers. However...**WE DO NEED YOUR HELP to make the Nut/Fruit Rolls and Pirohi.**

The rolls and pirohi are big selling items in our cookie sale. We need volunteers for both of these endeavors and would like you to schedule specific dates to help make these items. Lack of knowledge in how to make any of these is not an excuse to not volunteer, we will show you what to do; none of it is very difficult. Please contact the coordinators listed below, **these are both huge undertakings and we need YOUR help.**

We will be baking nut, poppyseed and apricot rolls on the following Saturdays: Oct. 28, Nov. 11 and Nov. 18. We need a minimum 500 rolls for our Christmas sales. **Each Saturday we need 11 people.** Most days it is the same 11 workers. Please volunteer to give these people a break because along with making rolls they are baking more than 40 dozen cookies each plus helping make pirohi, doing Sunday bakes and other jobs necessary to make the Cookie Sale work.

Please know you do not need to know how to make the rolls. We have a system and will teach you how we do things. If baking is not your thing, we also need help packaging the finished product and there is lots of clean up.

We will be making the pirohi on the Thursdays and Fridays from now until the sale. **We need a minimum of 500 DOZEN pirohi.** We need 2 people to help make the fillings on Thursdays and 10 people on Fridays to make the pirohi, pinch, boil and package.

We ask that you notify Pat with specific date(s) that you will help so that she can have enough prepared for the number of people that will be there. For example, if six people volunteer for a Friday and thirteen show up, there is not enough for everyone to do and vice versa.

Professors Parks' Ponderings

Liturgical Living:

Last time, I wrote about the importance of praying for our government and those serving our community, regardless of our own political agreement/disagreement. The next petition in the Litany is one asking for seasonable weather & "an abundance of the fruits of the earth".

The first time this petition really caught my attention in a practical way was a few years ago. I have family that live in the country and are neighbors with several farmers. That summer had been unusually rainy (one farmer said it had been over 20 years since he'd seen rain like that); they would call it "unseasonable" weather and immediately the words of our petition came to mind—this is why we pray for favorable weather! Farmers depend on seasonable weather to grow their crops and without it we don't get an "abundance of the fruits of the earth." Corn does not grow well in ponds, which was the condition most of my farming friends were dealing with.

While we don't exactly control the weather (otherwise I definitely would not have allowed the 80 degree weather we've been having lately), we can control how we care for gifts given to us. We can make efforts to reuse & recycle materials so as to better use our resources. We can find opportunities to learn about food production and farming to truly understand the impact of "favorable" weather; we can even be adventurous and grow some of our food ourselves (there's NOTHING like a freshly-picked homegrown tomato; also personally, I've long thought a parish community garden would be awesome if people were interested!).

My point is, this petition touches on our human role as stewards of God's creation. When we pray for seasonal weather and abundance, let us do so intentionally and mindfully and let us all try to think of ways that we can improve as good stewards.

Eastern Christian Formation

Jesus said: "Let the children come to Me, and do not prevent them; for the kingdom of Heaven belongs to such as these."

~ (Matthew 19:14)

In the spirit of Jesus' words above, we invite all the children (and their parents) to come up for the Gospel reading and to venerate the Gospel book.

As an aid to prepare for the Sunday Gospel, this bulletin segment will summarize the coming week's Gospel reading and show where to find it in the Bible so families can read the whole Gospel. We also are providing some discussion questions for families and friends to talk about together.

Gospel Summary for Oct. 29, 2017: Luke 8:41-56

One day, an important man came to see Jesus. His name was Jairus and he was the ruler of the synagogue. He fell down at Jesus' feet and begged Jesus to come to his house. His only daughter, who was 12 years old, was dying.

Jesus began to walk to Jairus' house. Everyone was crowding around Him. A woman was in the crowd who had been sick for 12 years and had spent all her money on doctors but was still sick. She squeezed in behind Jesus and touched the hem of his clothes. She knew right away that she was healed! Jesus said, "Who touched me?" He knew that healing power had gone out from Him. The woman was afraid. She fell down in front of Jesus and told Him she had touched Him so she could be healed. She told Him that she was healed. He said, "Because you believed in Me, you are healed. Go in peace."

While Jesus was still talking, a man came to Jairus and told him, "Your daughter died. You don't need Jesus' help anymore." Jesus told Jairus, "Don't be afraid, just believe and she'll be well." He kept going to the house. When He got to Jairus' house, Jesus only let Peter, James, John, Jairus, and his wife inside. They were crying. Jesus told them not to cry because the girl was just sleeping. The others laughed when Jesus said that, because she was dead.

Then Jesus took her hand and said, "Little girl, get up!" A miracle happened! She got up right away. Jesus asked that someone get her some food. Then He asked her parents not to tell anyone what had happened.

Family Discussion Questions:

1. Describe each of the two stories in this Gospel reading. How are they similar? Different?
2. If you or a loved one needed healing, would you act like Jairus or the sick woman? Why or why not?
3. Jesus is often referred to as the "Divine Physician." Jesus is the healer of our "soul and body." Where do you hear this in the Divine Liturgy?
