

Icon of the Parable of the Sower (Luke 8:5-15)

Listening to the Word of God

In the icon of the Parable of the Sower on the front cover of the bulletin we see Jesus sowing seeds of Divine Wisdom – His words – to four groups of people. Only one group, however, is listening attentively. The other three hear but do not listen. Rather, they are preoccupied with the "anxieties, riches and pleasures of this life." (Luke 8:14)

Which group are we in? We hear the Word of God spoken and preached in church each week, but do the cares and concerns of life and living cause us to quickly forget the lessons and examples taught by Jesus?

If we fail to integrate the teachings of Christ into our daily life, are we very different than the members of those three groups who heard but did not act on the Word of God? Consider the simple lesson from the following illustration:

Young Johnny reached for the ringing phone one Saturday evening, and his father told him, "If it's that guy from work calling, tell him I'm not home!" Later that evening, the family went out for dinner. Johnny's mother noticed that the waitress had undercharged them. "That's bad for them but good for us!" laughed mom. On the way home, dad explained to Johnny that the new radar detector he recently had installed on his car was to "beat the police" and avoid speeding tickets. Later that night, as Johnny finished his Sunday school lesson, he reflected on what a good Saturday it had been. It was much better than last Saturday when his parents grounded him for cheating on his math test.

What lessons do we teach by the examples we set?

The Sanctity of Life and Byzantine Spirituality

Marriage and Family Life Office Eparchy of Parma - October 2021

Each year during the month of October the Church directs us toward a special focus on the preservation of the sanctity of human life and in particular, human life from its very beginning in a mother's womb. Gender confusion, marital infidelity, divorce, sexual abuse, immodest dress, pornography, euthanasia, in fact all maladies and confusions in every area of human life, human relationships and human sexuality have their origins in what happens in the womb of womanhood. This can best be understood by simply looking into the rich and vast reservoir of our own Byzantine liturgical and mystical spirituality.

Mystically speaking, as our Byzantine spirituality does so well, it can be said that the marital bedroom is the sanctuary of the human race and a woman's womb is its tabernacle. What goes on in the bedroom does not "stay there." Rather, it actually determines the rise and fall of marriage, family and in turn civilization itself.

The sanctuary in the Byzantine tradition is also referred to as the "Holy of Holies." It is also symbolic of Heaven. But there is another mystical meaning to our sanctuary. Going all the way back to the Old Testament temple, the sanctuary in the Byzantine church is the mystical nuptial chamber. It is the meeting point of Christ the Bride Groom with His Bride in the Eucharist on the nuptial bed of the Altar. In this sanctuary the words of the Bridegroom Christ will be said, "Take eat, this is my body, broken for you." Christ offers Himself to his Bride as an oblation. The same words are spoken through the language or "theology of the body" in the marital embrace between husband and wife—a free, faithful, full and fruitful giving of their total selves to one another through their very bodies.

The tabernacle in Byzantine
Churches remains always on the
Altar with the Real Presence of
Christ in repose in the form of the
consecrated bread. The priest
stands facing the Altar and
tabernacle (Ad Orientum—east)
and assumes the role and posture
of the steward of the Eucharist,
and as an extension of the bishop,
the priest is the only one
authorized to handle and distribute

the Eucharist. (Deacons are actually "extraordinary ministers" of the Eucharist.)

Above the Altar in Byzantine sanctuaries it is prescribed to have an icon of the Platytera which hovers over the Altar and Tabernacle. "Playtera" means, "more spacious than the Heavens". Christ is depicted in the very interior of his Mother in this icon and we say of this icon that "He (Christ) whom not even the universe can contain is contained within the womb of a Virgin, making her more spacious than the Heavens." With Christ within her very body, her womb, the Virgin Mary herself becomes a "Mystical" or "Human" tabernacle. It was in the womb of this Virgin that Heaven and Earth met in a miraculous way

Every woman is configured to the Virgin Mary. Therefore, by extension, and mystically speaking, every woman has within her own body, a 'tabernacle', a sacred space where Heaven and earth meet in the miracle of the conception of a new human life. As the priest is the guardian and steward of the sanctity of the tabernacle in the sanctuary of the Church, so too, is the "priesthood" of every man, to act as the guardian of the sanctity of the womb of womanhood.

Everything about and within the tabernacle on the Altar in the Church is about sanctity and life. The priest would never place anything in the tabernacle nor approach the tabernacle in any way that would militate against the integrity of the tabernacle. In a similar way, the "priesthood" of every man is called to protect the sanctity of woman's womb from any approach or thing that would militate against sanctity and life. In Chapter 8 of the book of Tobit in the Bible, the couple Tobiah and Sarah are presented as holy examples because prior to the consummation of their marriage on their wedding night, they prayed that God would help them to keep their marital act pure.

Through its architecture, Art, ritual and gesture, we can see that the mystical meaning for the sanctity of the bedroom, the marital act, of woman's womb and man's priestly responsibility toward the sanctity of her womb finds its very context in the Liturgy of the Church.

The defilement of the sanctity of the womb of womanhood came about, despite the urgent warning of the Church, when the modern world chose to embrace a contraceptive rather than a sacramental or mystical worldview of human sexuality. Once again the mystical spirituality of the Byzantine Church is helpful in understanding the intrinsic evil of contraception.

By 'mystical' we mean that something of a physical and earthly nature can reveal and make present invisible or Heavenly realities. Applying the mystical meaning to the marital embrace we see, as St. John Paul II taught, that through their very bodies in the marital embrace the husband and wife 'speak a language.' Their actions speak a theology. They can love as God loves and participate in the very interior life of the Holy Trinity whereby, through the marital embrace, and like the Holy Trinity, the husband and wife form a union and communion of persons that is both unitive and procreative. The mystical language of their bodies says that they are giving themselves unreservedly to each other in this marital embrace. Introducing something artificial into that action separates the unitive from the procreative and sets up a certain dishonesty in the action because with artificial contraception the couple is no longer giving themselves freely as gift to each other but they are holding something back from one or the other—their fertility. This is what constitutes the essential evil of contraception. This separation of procreation from the unitive act of the marital embrace is what gave rise to an entirely utilitarian, non-sacramental view of human sexuality and in turn opened the door to the relational and sexual confusion and maladies we suffer under during these modern times. Once we remove the element of child bearing from the marital act, it becomes open to being redefined and used any way we want.

In recent years, Pro-Life activist communities are realizing that in order to truly stop abortion and restore all of the threats to the sanctity of human life in all its forms, there will have to be the restoration of the sanctity of the marital embrace and the womb of womanhood. The world will have to abandon the utilitarian, contraceptive worldview and recover the true Sacramental worldview of human sexuality whose context is seen, communicated and lived in the Liturgy of the Church.

Recommended Litanies to be inserted into the Litany of Supplication at the Divine Liturgy for the Sundays in October (or any other Liturgy):

O God, our heavenly Father, Creator of all human life, we adore You and worship You. You created all people in Your image and likeness. May we, Your people, dedicate ourselves to defending the pre-born, the terminally ill, the disabled and all those threatened by the culture of death from all seen and unseen evil, we pray you hear us and have mercy.

Response: Lord have mercy 3x

O God, our Heavenly Father, Author of all life, help us always to respect all human life, from conception to natural death. Let Your Most Holy Spirit enlighten the minds and open the hearts of those who do not fully respect all human life according to Your Will. Reveal Your loving presence to expectant mothers who experience fear, doubt, isolation and confusion. Lighten their burdens. Grant them guidance, reassurance and peace by Your Grace, we pray You hear us and have mercy.

Response: Lord have mercy 3x

We also pray for those who are despondent because of age or illness; especially for those tempted to end their lives; for all who are alone and afraid; for those who sit on death row, or single mothers feeling abandoned by all; that our Heavenly Father would grant them patient endurance to do His Will, we prayYou, hear us and graciously have mercy.

Response: Lord have mercy 3x
